


On September 10th will be the peak of the 2019 Atlantic Hurricane Season, which is just around the corner. It is ironic that Hurricane Irma hit the State of Florida on September 10, 2017, the peak of the 2017 Atlantic Hurricane Season. Everyone needs to stay vigilant between now and the end of the Atlantic Hurricane Season on November 30th. On August 8th, NOAA released their mid hurricane season outlook. The number of named storms, hurricanes, and major hurricanes is slightly up from the outlook issued in

May. The outlook was revised slightly upward due to the collapse of the El Nino in the Pacific Ocean that had been in place since late last year. Although our tropical storm activity has been slow until now, it is expected to increase shortly, especially with the peak of the season coming soon.



Please continue to monitor the latest Tropical Weather Outlook issued by the National Hurricane Center in Miami. These storms can pop up very quickly, especially late in the season, so vigilance is the operative word here. Keep a constant check on your equipment and supplies to be sure they are ready when you need them the most. If a storm is predicted to get close to the State of Florida, fuel and canned goods can become short in supply, so we have to be thinking ahead. Those of us in ARES, CERT, and ACS have to especially be on guard, so we do not get caught unprepared.

Our planning for the 20th Anniversary Celebration of the ARRL West Central Florida Section in 2020 continues and I think you will enjoy what we are planning. Details will be forthcoming in subsequent issues of the WCF PRESSER this fall. Preparations are underway for the 19th Annual ARRL West Central Florida

OPEN LETTER TO EAGLE NET PARTICIPANTS

From: Dave Rockwell, W4PXE, Net Manager, West Central Florida National Traffic (Eagle) Net

Fellow amateur operators,

Recently, some members of our community have taken it upon themselves to complain and correct fellow amateurs, over-the-air, regarding radio practice. Such corrections on-air, go against the long-standing practice of both commercial and amateur operators. As one who has spend a number of years as one and then the other, I'd like to request that we all refrain from correcting fellow amateurs' radio practice on-the-air.

Both when I began work as a commercial operator in 1973 and later in my training as a Military Affiliate (now Auxiliary) Radio System (MARS) augmentee and emergency radiotelephone operator, it was continuously stressed that we do not correct other operators' practice over-the-air. First, detracts from the principles of clear, concise, and effective communications. Additionally, correcting operators on-the-air undermines their confidence and can compromise the "professionalism". It is perfectly acceptable to point out technical issues that compromise effective communications, but we must refrain from deriding fellow operators' practices. For example, it is acceptable to point, on FM, that an operator might be overdriving their audio, when in-turn causes the signal to break up. It is not acceptable to complain about how an operator makes a call or what phonetics he or she uses.

Our Eagle Net is a semi-controlled net, meaning that stations are may call net control rather than net control being the only station authorized to make calls. Many military nets are fully controlled. These are often called roll-call nets, because net control calls each station in order. Some HF traffic nets operate as roll-call nets as well. The instance of doubling is reduced, though it can occur on open call segments (e. g. calling for any short of time stations). In semi-open nets, the jury is out whether it is better to just make your call or to pause between the call out (i.e. "Net Control") and your ID (e.g., This is W4PXE). Personally, I unkey between the two and listen. That doesn't always prevent doubling, but if I do hear another station, then I wait my turn. Either way, we all must be patient. Remember, there are no prizes to be won to be the first person to check in for a county. There will be plenty of opportunities.

If you feel compelled to correct an operator on his or her practice, do it offline. If the person is active in QRZ, look up the email and send a short, courteous note. Alternatively, wait until after the net and call the station. If he or she answers, exchange phone numbers or emails and take the discussion off-air. We all share this medium and need to be a courteous and non-confrontational as possible, so everyone can enjoy our hobby, improve our skills, and expand our amateur radio people network. We are all in this hobby together and may need to rely on each other in a crisis.

COUNTY PARKS ON THE AIR STILL UNDERWAY THROUGH THE END OF 2019



TUNING INTO THE WORLD OF AMATEUR RADIO PODCASTS

Ham radio is a great hobby. You can talk to people from all over the world on just a couple of watts and a wire. One new aspect



of ham radio is podcasts. A podcast is a digital audio or video file made available on the Internet for downloading to a computer or mobile device, typically available as a series, new installments of

which can be received by subscribers automatically. Now with the new technology that is out there many people are doing LIVE streaming of their podcasts. This is a great media form cause now you can join a live podcast and be able to interact with the host or hosts of the show.

I have been watching and listening to podcast for the past couple of years. I find the audio podcasts good because when you are on a long road trip all you have to do is punch one up on your smartphone or tablet and play it threw the car stereo. I find this much better that listening to regular terrestrial AM of FM stations. The radio stations are always playing commercials. How many times can you listen to the same ad about product XYZ?

This review is going to be about my personnel

favorite 5 ham radio video podcasts. All of them are available freely on the internet by going to the home page of the show. They are easy to listen to or watch on any home computer, laptop, or cell phone. I have an iPhone so I use Apple's podcasting app to add podcasts. The App will tell you when a new podcast is available. You tube is another way of

watching video podcasts. Log in to your YouTube account. Search for the name of the podcast and then subscribe to it. Check the notifications bell if you want to be notified

every time there is a new video.

Now for my very favorite video podcasts.



W5KUB. Tom Medlin has been streaming his show on the internet for several years. In 2015 he started streaming his show called Amateur Radio Roundtable. The show was really about what is going on in the ham radio world today. The show has a good bunch of cohosts that join in there every week. Some cohosts to mention are Katie Allen WY7YL, Rich Moseson, W2VU, editor of CQ magazine, Josh Nass KI6NAS, Joe Eisenberg K0NEB, Dave Casler KE0OG, Martin F. Jue K5FLU- Founder of MFJ, Riley Hollingsworth K4ZDH- special counsel to FCC.

Besides their video podcasting over the internet they are also simulcasted on world famous shortwave station WBCQ on 5130 kHz. During the show you can join in on the chat room that is available. When everything is working properly Tom also takes phone calls near the end of the show. His show has been

known to run anywhere from an hour to 2 hours. You can find out more at their website http://w5kub.com.

In addition to the regular weekly shows that they do , the crew takes the show on the road. Tom and the



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gang travel to some of the larger hamfest/ conventions in the country. Hamvention in Xenia Ohio, Huntsville Hamfest in Alabama are two of the top shows that they do live streaming from.

Prizes , Prizes, Prizes. Every year the W5KUB.com crew give away prizes to their listeners during the Dayton and Huntsville hamfests. So, if you are in the chat room you are automatically registered to win. (note: See w5kub.com for official rules)

After watching the show for the past 2 years I can honestly say that it feels like you are with family. I have been to many hamfests where the show has been live streaming. In the time that I have spent at these hamfests I have been lucky to meet with Tom , Katie, Joe. They are a good bunch of hams and a good bunch of people that have a love for Amateur Radio. I have gotten to know some of the hosts outside of the "ham radio thing". I enjoy their company and conversation. One of the hosts, Katie Allen WY7YL , we call each other

Coming in 2nd on my list of amateur radio podcasts has to be the show Ham Nation. With just over 400 episodes under their belt, yes you read that correctly FOUR HUNDRED shows. They bring you an excellent and informative show every Wednesday night. The hosts of the show are Bob Heil K9EID, Gordon West WB6NOA, George Thomas W5JDX, Don Wilbanks AE5DW, Valerie Hotzfeld NV9L, Amanda Alden K1DDN, Dale Puckett K0HYD. This show is part of the Twit.TV network. The show's website is https://twit.tv/shows/ham-nation

If having fun with amateur radio was illegal these people would all have life sentences. You never know what is going to happen when you get this group together. The one thing I do know is that Gordo will be wearing some colorful dress shirt to capture the attention of the viewers. The show has many different segments that they manage to get done in about 90 minutes. All different ham radio topics are discussed during the show. One week the show will detail how to build a single band dipole antenna for the newly licensed ham. On another episode they will be discussing building a tube transmitter and receiver on a pine wood board. They also make the trip to some of the larger hamfests and conventions across the nation. Shoot some video, do some interviews and later put on the air. One of my favorite segments is called "Smoke and Solder" where George W5JDX assembles various ham radio related "stuff". George gives the audience tips on how to make it. A lot of the time he will take video to show step by step how something went together. Don Wilbanks brings us the weekly edition of Amateur Radio Newsline. Amamda takes questions from the viewers, sometimes shows off pictures of ham shacks that were sent into her. One of my favorite part of the show is when they explain home brewing stuff. Not only do they show you how to build a project, but the plans are on their website. Dr.

In the meantime, you can start watching or listening to many different podcasts. If your new to this here are some simple instructions on how to. You can use any computer or phone that has a web browser, like Chrome, Safari or Microsoft Edge. Just go to the website that has podcasts,

for example arrl.org/doctor. Follow the instructions on their website. Most offer many options on how to listen/watch their show.

If you are using a smart-phone, iPhone, or iPad. I can say that all of these devices have an App for podcasts. If it's not, go to the app store. Android phones you can use the Google podcasts app. Install the app. Open the Podcast app and go to the search page and type in the name of the podcast you want to find eg: ham talk live. Choose the podcast you want from the search results and click or tap on it again. Once on the podcast homepage you should see a list of most recent episodes. Just click or tap on one that you would like to listen to.





YAESU FT3DR REVIEW Chris Bloxsom, AA4CB ARRL Public Information Officer

At the Dayton Hamvention Yaesu showed the public its new hand-held radio. The FT3DR. It is



a replacement for the current FT2DR. The radio looks really impressive. I had a chance to hold one in my hand at Dayton Hamvention. I was like a kid in the candy store pressing buttons and asking John Kruk, national sales manager for

Yaesu USA, a lot of questions. They were not available for sale then but they are now.

The FT3DR is a 2m/70 dual band hand-held radio. It has 2 receivers. That means dual band simultaneous receive. You can listen to both VHF & VHF or VHF & UHF or any combination of VHF and UHF. There are two decoders in that small radio. You can listen to 2 C4FM signals at the same time. Say you have the 146.880 Dade City K4EX repeater on VFO A and the 146.670 Port Richey WA4GDN repeater set to VFO B on the radio. You can monitor both frequencies at the same time. The radio has a full 5 watts of output power. You can of course choose to lower the power output to 2.5w, 1 watt of even .3 of a watt. Zero-point three (0.3) watts is great to amateurs who are using some type of "spot" like an Open-spot or a ZUMspot or some type of MMDVM. There are too many to list here. This is nice when operating C4FM it will not drain your battery as quickly as full power would do. If you have the Yaesu MH-851A11U optional camera / speaker microphone you can send and receive FULL COLOR pictures over the air. The color TFT LCD screen is set at 320x240. I have used this mic many times with my FTM-400 and FT2DR.

The Yaesu FT3DR is nicely packaged. When you open the box the first thing you see is the manual on top. This is a real book. It is not a sheet of paper with the basics on a radio, like some of the Chinese radios come with. After going through the manual, I can say that Yaesu as done



nice job with getting information into the user's guide. There are plenty of screen shots to show you what the screen on the radio will look like when you navigate the keyboard driven menu. Inside the box in addition to the radio you will find the antenna, a battery charger, a USB cable (just for doing future firmware updates. This is not a programming cable.) and a 7.2 volt 2,200 mAh Lithium battery pack the SBR-14Li model. Other battery packs of different sizes and milli-amphours are available from Yaesu authorized dealers.

The FT3DR has a slightly smaller than the FT2DR. It does feels more comfortable in your hand. The side buttons have a slight angle to it. The radio is styled after to the FT-70 handheld. This is the latest and greatest handheld from Yaesu. They built this radio on suggestions from its customers. The color screen is the most noticeable feature of the radio. While the FT2 had an LCD grey screen display, the FT3 is now LCD full color. If you have an FT2 already, then all the accessories can be used on the ft3. charge, cables, mics, antennas.

Another new feature you get is the built-in Bluetooth. The Bluetooth enables you to operate the handheld with easy hands-free operation. You can purchase the Yaesu Bluetooth headset (SSM-BT10) to talk and listen to the radio or you can pair it with a BT enabled speaker that you might already have to just listen to the radio. The Bluetooth is built into the radio. On some other models you had to buy and install a Bluetooth board yourself. Not so here with the FT3DR. Something that I find really neat is the ability to record audio. With the SD card installed (up to 32GB) and configured you will be able to voice record the received and transmitted audio. This could be a useful during ARES events.

Just like its predecessor FT2DR the FT3DR has APRS built in. You can only run APRS on VFO B.

The radio comes with a high-sensitivity 66 channel GPS antenna. This increases the accuracy of the receiver and will give you an accurate local to where you are. Speaking of VFO B you can now add a name to your stored memory channels. This was not possible with the FT2DR. You could only assign a name to memory channels stored on VFO A.

My final thoughts on the FT3DR. I have owned all the C4FM radios that Yaesu has produced. I like the navigability of this one and it has all the "bells and whistles" needed to operate the Wires-X network. Navigating the menu system is easy. Battery life last pretty long. Yaesu has made storing memory channels even easier than before. You do not need a cable and PC to program.
