Any Support Function in a Storm

August 2025

#### Fellow ARES® Members,

Many of us radio amateurs feel our time on the airwaves is an end in itself. We rag chew, participate in DXing, contest, etc. because we find enjoyment and satisfaction operating our radio equipment and having fellowship with other hams. For most of us, that's what drew us to the hobby and lead us to invest in our stations.

On the other hand, those of us who participated in public service recognize that the agencies we support have specific missions they perform. Radio communications are a component of completing those missions. As public service operators, we have a responsibility to understand our sponsoring agencies' missions. Within the Emergency Management Community, we have developed a set of designators, known as Emergency Support Functions or ESFs that help us categorize missions performed in support of our whole community. Here is a table of the ESFs we recognize here in Florida (see <a href="https://www.floridadisaster.org/sert1/esf/">https://www.floridadisaster.org/sert1/esf/</a>):

ARES communicators are not expected to be expert in all 20 ESFs, though a passing knowledge of what each area covers will serve you well. As an ARES or AUXCOMM communicator, you should have a thorough understanding of the ESFs supported by your sponsoring agency.

All of us in ARES should have a solid understanding of ESF #2, Communications, since we fall into the communications units when activated. Most communications services during an emergency are provided by commercial communications carriers such as Internet service providers, cellular providers, and public service communications units. Generally, we ARES members augment these services for our supported agencies. Also, we often provide the contingency or emergency communications component when there has been catastrophic disruption of the communications infrastructure.

If your sponsoring agency serves in another ESF, you should learn how communications support their missions. Become familiar with the standard operating procedures for the agency response. Take the time to gain at least an apprentice-level understanding of how that agency goes about its response operations. For example, if your agency supports ESF #11, Food and Water, you should have a solid understanding of how they set up Points of Distribution (PODs) and the logistics of moving the food and water from intake point to the POD, etc. This level of understanding makes you better able to take resource request messages and relay them to recipients effectively.

Remember, to be an effective public service communicator requires continuous learning. A solid understanding of the ESFs your agency supports make you a valuable member of their team.
