Professional Humility - Leave Egos at Home

December 2025

Fellow ARES® Members,

[Editor's Note: We originally planned our December issue to focus on SKYWARN ® and weather readiness in conjunction with SKYWARN Recognition Day (SRD). Sadly, the ongoing government shutdown has limited the scope of SRD this year.]

I'm sure all of us in public service have come across individuals who believe they are "large and in-charge". They insist that they be the lead and boss everyone around. When we encounter two individuals who immediately but heads, they become disruptive to our response to the incident situation. This attitude and mindset are counterproductive and can result in operational failures and safety hazards. Also, this does not present a "Professional" image. In our emergency communications training, we should all have learned to leave our egos at home. When we are activated and report to an incident or event, we need to be open-minded and willing to do what is needed, not necessarily our specialty. I've come to call this **professional humility**.

Many of you know that I am a fan of artificial intelligence (AI). I asked Google's AI tool, Gemini, to explain professional humility. Here's what I learned.

Professional humility is the practice of acknowledging one's limitations while valuing the contributions and perspectives of others. It involves self-awareness, a willingness to learn from mistakes, and prioritizing the collective good over personal ego. This trait fosters better teamwork, stronger relationships, and a culture of continuous improvement.

Key characteristics of professional humility:

- **Self-awareness:** Recognizing your strengths and weaknesses honestly, without arrogance or excessive pride.
- **Openness to others:** Valuing the ideas, skills, and contributions of colleagues, team members, and clients, and being open to learning from them.
- **Focus on the collective:** Prioritizing the common welfare and team success over personal gain or recognition.
- Accountability: Admitting mistakes and taking responsibility for them rather than blaming others.
- **Service orientation:** Directing your attention outwards to understand and assist others, fostering a spirit of service.
- **Continuous learning:** Acknowledging that you can always learn more and using mistakes as opportunities for growth.

How professional humility is demonstrated:

- **Giving credit:** Acknowledging the team's collective effort in a project's success rather than taking personal credit.
- **Welcoming feedback:** Actively seeking and incorporating different ideas into your work, even if they are better than your own.
- **Encouraging others:** Nurturing the development of team members and helping them achieve their goals.
- **Being accessible:** Maintaining an open-door policy and encouraging questions to create a supportive learning environment.

As ARES radio operators, we need to be ready to provide the services needed at an incident

or event. Maybe you wanted to be the net control station (NCS), but the event organizer has two NCS operators already. You might be asked to be the operator at Water Station #3. Accept the position and give it your best. Check in with your tactical call sign, when called (and don't forget to close with your amateur call). When you are not handling radio traffic, volunteer to help the team at the water station. You could hand out bottles or collect the empties. I know you didn't sign up to be "water boy", but showing a willingness to pitch in and get the job done goes a long way to fostering positive attitudes among our supported organizations.

Similar situations arise during emergency or disaster incidents. You might be asked to help direct evacuees coming to a shelter to the sign-in table when you are not on the radio. Remember, do not take on any duties for which you are not qualified. Be ready to lend a helping hand when needed. It goes without saying though, don't let these collateral duties interfere with your primary mission of communications. If necessary, politely advise the requester that you have a radio check-in coming up and so you need to decline at that moment. When in doubt, follow the directions of your on-site supervisor. Oh, don't forget to note these duties and discussions in your ICS-214 Activity Log.

Professional humility goes a long way to reducing stress during an event or incident. Especially during a disaster, keeping stress to a minimum is necessary. We are most effective when we have heightened awareness but are free from debilitating stresses. The first step in this process is leaving our egos at home. Do what we are asked to do to the best of our ability and pride ourselves on jobs well-done. We will leave a good impression with our supported partners. Be a member of your agency's team before, during, and after your participation. And don't forget to thank them for the opportunity to be included.

So, when in doubt, BE HUMBLE!
